These initiatives focus on enhancing their social, economic, and political status through financial support, education, health, safety, and skill development.

Government Schemes for Women Empowerment

For Financial Inclusion and Economic Empowerment

- **Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana (PMJDY)** This scheme promotes financial inclusion by providing access to banking services, including zero-balance accounts, with a special focus on enrolling rural women's.
- **Pradhan Mantri Mudra Yojana (PMMY)** It gives collateral-free loans of up to ₹20 lakh to small business owners, with a focus on supporting women-led enterprises.
- **Stand-Up India Scheme** This provides loans ranging from ₹10 lakh to ₹1 crore to women entrepreneurs from Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe (SC/ST) communities to encourage entrepreneurship.
- **Lakshpati Didi Scheme** This scheme aims to empower women in Self-Help Groups (SHGs) by providing them with skills and support to help them earn a sustainable income of at least ₹1 lakh per year.
- **Mahila E-Haat** An online marketing platform that enables women entrepreneurs to sell their products directly to buyers, promoting self-reliance.

For Health and Nutrition

- **Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana (PMMVY)** This scheme provides cash incentives to pregnant and lactating women for the first live birth to make better health-seeking behavior and nutrition.
- **Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY)** It promotes institutional deliveries to reduce maternal and infant mortality rates by providing cash assistance.



- **Mission Indradhanush** This initiative ensures the full immunization of pregnant women and children to protect them from various diseases.
- **Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana (PMUY)** This scheme provides free LPG connections to women from below-poverty-line (BPL) families, giving them access to clean cooking fuel and reducing health hazards.

- **One-Stop Centre (OSC) Scheme** These centers provide integrated support, including medical aid, legal assistance, and counseling, to women affected by violence.
- **Women Helpline (181)** A 24x7 toll-free helpline that provides emergency support and information to women in distress across the country.
- **Ujjwala Scheme** This scheme is focused on combating trafficking and providing rehabilitation and support to survivors.
- **Mahila Shakti Kendra (MSK)** This scheme aims to empower rural women through community participation and by creating a supportive ecosystem at the village level.
