Worldwide Emergency Coverage:

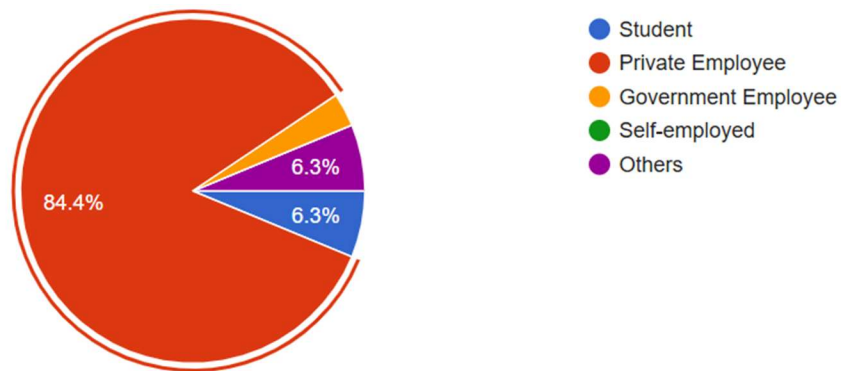

Financial Consequences of Ignoring Health Insurance



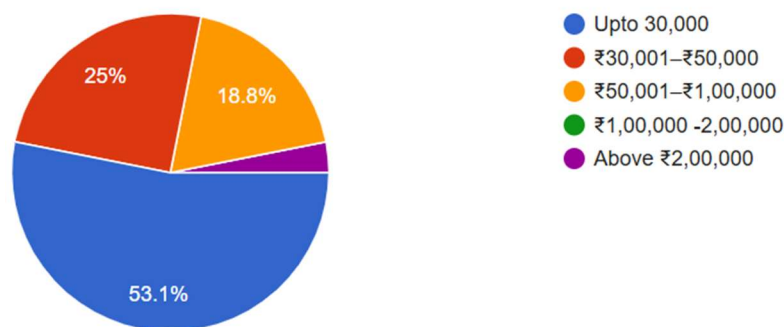

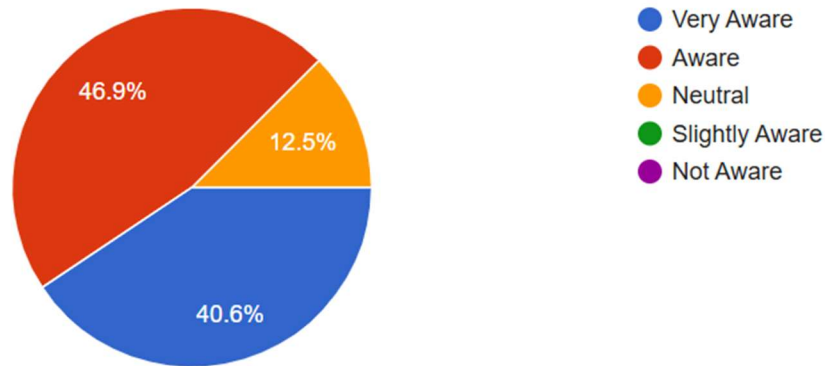
Monthly Income of Respondents





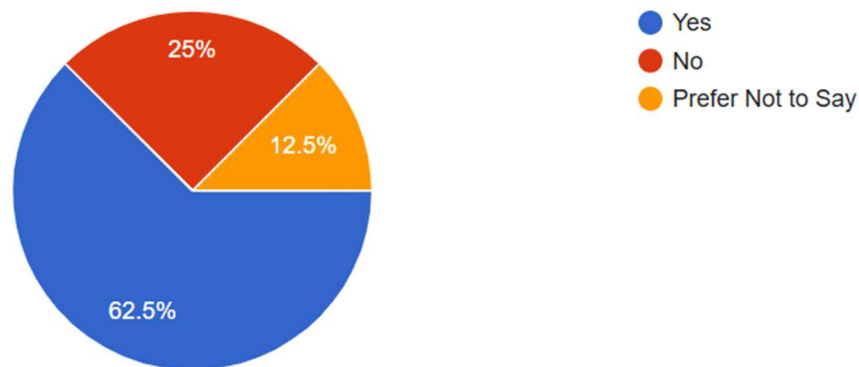

Respondents Experience of Financial Difficulties Due to Medical Expenses Without Health Insurance

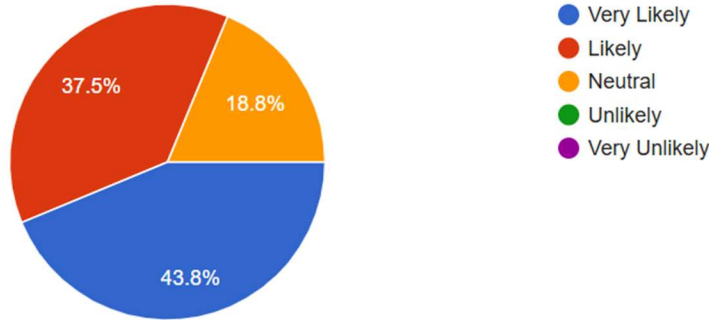

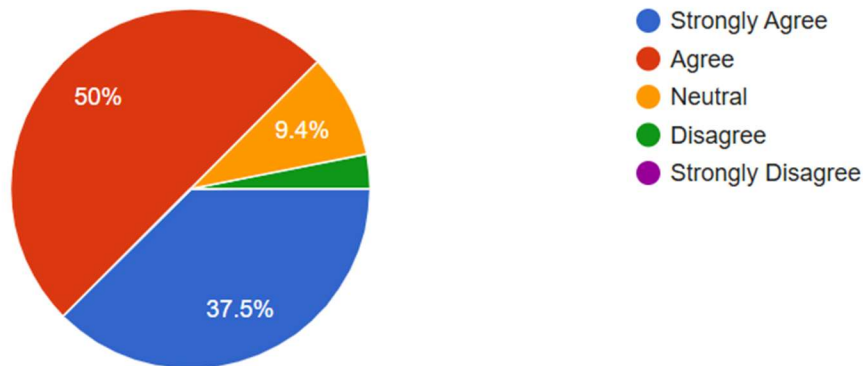
preferred not to disclose their situation. This indicates that lack of health insurance can impose serious financial strain on many households.

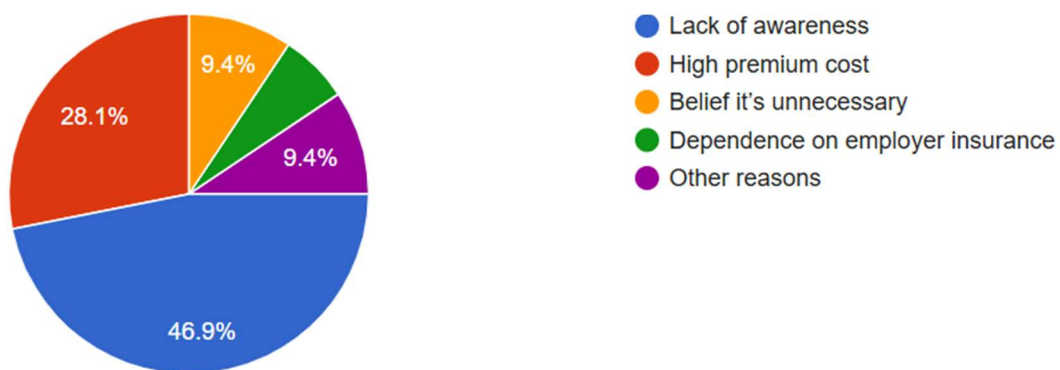
Impact of Ignoring Health Insurance in Personal Finance Planning – An Overview

The Reason Behind People Ignore to Buy Health Insurance



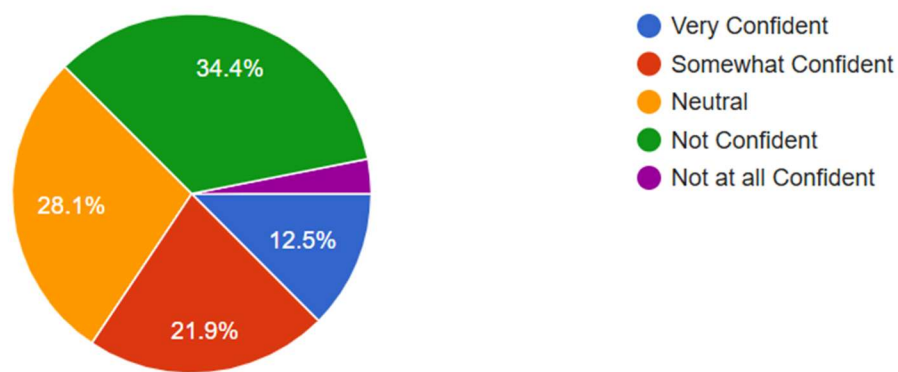

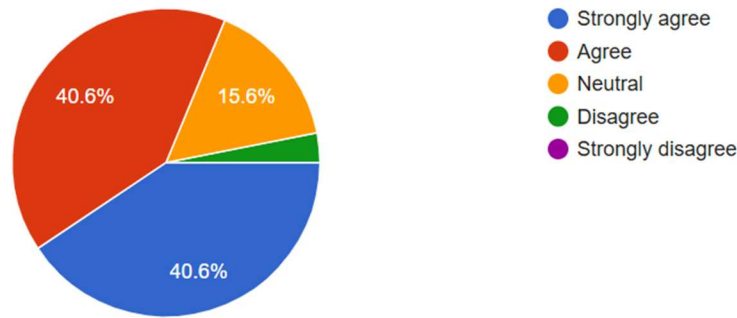
